

A Don deal?

It's like the clearances all over again. Homeowners in Aberdeen were dealt a blow on the 1st October as the local council refused to rule out Compulsory Purchase Orders (CPOs) being issued, which would force residents from their homes. The driving force behind attempts to make locals sell up is the Donald Trump Organisation, which is finalising plans for a £1billion golf resort at Balmedie.

Following months of uncertainty over the project, Councillor Martin Ford, a leading opponent of the Trump scheme, tabled a motion against the use of CPOs.

As Councillors arrived at the Aberdeen Conference Centre to vote on the issue, they were met by a crowd of anti-Trump protestors waving placards. A petition containing 15,000 signatures was brought by David Milne, one of the four homeowners refusing to leave the Menie estate.

Mr Milne, who has lived at

Hermit Point for 17 years, urged the Council to make a final decision to prevent CPOs being used: "I don't know how many of you have even tried to imagine what its like not knowing if your home will be your own for much longer. Not knowing if the next birthday or Christmas will be the last in your own house.

"To delay taking this vote today would also add to the intolerable, psychological torture that we are under.

"I ask you now to stand up for your own personal conscience, stand up for ethics, stand-up for morals and stand up for the reputation of Aberdeenshire by rejecting both the developers request to delay the decision and the basic concept of a local authority using compulsory purchase powers to support a private commercial leisure development to the detriment of its constituents."

The proposals for Menie Estate include two championship golf courses, 950 holiday homes and 500 houses, and were approved by the Scottish government last December. Since then the Trump Organisation has claimed that further land is required to achieve the vision of building the "world's greatest" golf venue – despite verbal assurances to homeowners which assured them otherwise.

One of the four affected residents, Susan Munro, who has lived at Leyton Cottage for 28 years, said Trump had promised her that no more land was needed. "The last thing Mr Trump said to me was, 'Susan, I don't need your house, I don't need your land, I have plenty, we'll be good neighbours'.

"It's been my home for almost 30 years, but the council will just give in to Trump. It's our heritage, a protected bit of land."

The authering momentum of opposition to the Trump Organisation has seen protests take place nationwide. Several iconic statues in Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen and Stirling were covered with masks of Donald Trump's face (pictured opposite). The Menie Liberation Front said that the masks were intended to draw attention to the arowing resistance to the tycoon's plans. A spokesman says: "We are dressing up famous Scottish statues as the American tycoon to symbolise the way Trump thinks he can walk over Scotland. This development has gone too far."

Homeless film in Fife

Homeless people in Fife have talked frankly on camera about surviving on the streets and grappling with local services. The film-makers hope the powerful testimonies will help to transform attitudes to homelessness in the area – where community hostility has led to the planned closure of two hostels. *Journey Through The System* premiers in Glenrothes this month, before an audience which includes local MSPs.

It was the brainchild of clients of the Gilven Projects, a campaign to support homeless people run by the Scottish Christian Alliance. "Some of our young clients pointed out that people's true experiences of homelessness are never really shown," said Laura McNamee, the projects' employability coordinator.

Originally planned as a small-



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scale venture, the resulting film grew thanks to Gilven's contacts with graduates of Adam Smith College in Kirkcaldy. Alex Harron w as director, with Gilven providing contacts for interviewees.

The documentary touches on the many different aspects of homelessness. In one scene, Sammy Wyatt (pictured left), 21, points out the road bridge under which she and her partner survived for months, in sometimes freezing conditions. There are also contributions from a woman who became homeless after fleeing domestic violence, and from two 16-year-old girls who were thrown out of their homes.

Frontline workers who support homeless people also give their views, as does Lindsay Roy, the Labour MP for Glenrothes. And three local councillors are shown trying to access local services as though they had just become homeless.

"We wanted to show how daunting the whole process can be," McNamee explained. "Two of the councillors were asked to call a local agency for help. They had to find a telephone number and a phone box, and they were then bombarded with the very personal questions that people are asked when they register as homeless.

"The third councillor went to pick up a food parcel. He happened to be intolerant of some food groups, so he would have faced the choice of not eating, or making himself ill."

While the film focuses heavily on the struggles faced by readers, it features some success stories too. "We spoke to some people who got through it and found light at the end of the tunnel – as well as some who got involved in drugs and crime," McNamee added.

The project was given added impetus by recent decisions to close two Fife hostels: Melanie House in Leven and James Bank Hostel in Dunfermline. Locals had complained of crime and drug use in the

hostels. The plan is to replace the facilities with 'core and cluster' services – dispersed temporary accommodation with an on-call warden.

"In our opinion these decisions are uninformed, because the councillors don't know what goes on in hostels and the support required by people who live there," said Trish O'Brien, Gilven project manager. "We hope to raise awareness through the DVD."

Connect 2

A scheme designed to give former addicts and homeless people the chance to work within the social care sector has proven a success in South Lanarkshire.

The Connect 2 programme, which is run by the local council, offers a six-month course specifically devised for residents who may have faced addiction problems or homelessness in the past to secure jobs.

The course consists of a four week pre-employment programme guaranteeing that participants are ready for the world of work when the scheme is complete, followed by a work placement and study towards their SVQ level 3 in Health & Social Care. The final part of the course focuses on the personal development of participants and job searching for opportunities in the care sector.

The scheme is the only one in the UK to train and mentor participants before securing them work placements and a recognised qualification. Participants receive face to face support throughout the course, with weekly support meetings to discuss progress and training needs.

Peter Shiels, Connect 2 Training Co-ordinator said: "Participants receive support with their personal development to build up their confidence and motivation. We provide a range of support tailored to meet the needs of each individual. We even have mentors to help participants adjust to the wholesale change Connect 2 brings about in their lives. In many cases we're working with people who wouldn't normally have been able to access the chances they're now experiencing without the help of Connect 2."

One person who has benefited from the programme is Khrosow, who came to the UK from Iran in 1979 to study engineering before opening a takeaway in Motherwell after failing to get a career in engineering underway. As a result of not being able to work in his chosen field, Khrosow's life descended into addiction to drink and drugs for a number of years.


An assault at work further contributed to Khosrow losing his business and he admits to looking for an excuse not to work, blaming everyone but himself for his predicament.

Seven years ago, however, Khrosow decided to turn his life around by tackling his addiction head on and becoming sober. He carried out some volunteer work with SOLVE, the Scottish Drugs Forum and the Citizens Advice Bureau. Finally in May 2008, he started the Connect 2 Programme which has increased his confidence and employability considerably.

"The course quickly made me feel that doors were opening for me. Being part of the programme has helped me rebuild self-esteem, confidence and motivation. My employability skills have been brought up to date whilst my learning development and social skills have received a big boost," he said.

After completing the programme, Khrosow secured a job and is currently employed at Lifeways in Cambuslang, and has volunteered as a drink and drugs counsellor at Phoenix Futures. "I would encourage anyone who wants to turn their life around to get involved in the Connect 2 programme," he said.

Void of imagination

As homeless people struggle to secure a tenancy and hard working families are forced to pay through the nose for poor and often substandard private accommodation, perfectly good houses across Renfrewshire lie derelict says a local campaigner.

Scottish Socialist Party worker Jimmy Kerr (pictured right) hopes to persuade Renfrewshire Council to consider refurbishing void houses to bring down housing waiting lists and ease the shortage of homes in Renfrewshire. The 34 year old activist is particularly concerned with the West End, one area with a very high number of voids, which are not only an eyesore for the residents, but cause multiple related social problems, including vandalism and graffiti. More importantly they create the preconditions for other more serious crimes including drug dealing and gang activity.

"Currently, we have a critical shortage of housing across Renfrewshire and Scotland," Kerr said, "yet demolition seems to be Renfrewshire Council's answer to everything, and we have seen hundreds of potential homes flattened, which could have been brought up to standard.

The building was constructed by developers for the long-established charity, free of charge, in exchange for the land at their old premises. The sparkling new site will continue to be a place of opportunity and support for vulnerable adults, providing food and essential services, as well as a comprehensive programme of activities including healthy eating classes, woodworking, art and music.

It's crowning achievement is the roof terrace, which will eventually support a gardening club.
